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## **PRODUCTION** (35 Marks max)

- 1. **Director's interpretation of the play** (and see expansion of this criteria)
- 2. Adequacy of pace and cue taking
- 3. Effectiveness of climaxes
- 4. Acting teamwork (balance, harmony)
- 5. Assessment of ensemble production achievement (consider all elements of the production team)

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## **ACTING** (40 Marks max)

Small, supporting roles, e.g. walk-on, sentries and other "extras" are not assessed individually. Their effect, however, is assessed under PRODUCTION Otherwise, each actor must be assessed on:

- a. Interpretation of Character
- b. Stage Presence & Control
- c. Use of Voice (Diction, Variety)
- d. How demanding was the part played?

# **ENDEAVOUR (**10 Marks max)

Assess how much the play represented a real challenge to the Team; if there was originality and significant dramatic achievement in the production.

## **Expansion of the Director's Interpretation of the Play**

What did the Director bring to this production? Was it merely a revival of a `museum piece' or was there something new and inspiring in an old play or vibrant in a new piece?

Despite your own interpretation of what the play was about and how it should be staged consider:

- Depth of analysis of the script carried out by the director
- Director's imagination to supplement the text (like the actor- what 'life' did the director breathe into the text~play~production?)
- In addition to the marking for PRESENTATION, did the set design and integration with the acting add to the production? Was there more than just an interpretation of the text directions on the stage?
- Was there harmony between any symbolism in the setting/music/atmosphere and the acting?
- Were the visual images inspired by theme of the play
- Was there contemporary relevance in the play. Did the theme or staging relate to issues of `today'?
- What was the Audience reaction? Remember stunned silence in a drama can be as equally valid as raucous laughter in a farce.
- Did it `work' on the night

Consider how the director used the Stage space.

- Was the "4th Wall' used appropriately? Was the `Barrier' with the audience broken down or experimented with? Was there Creative use of the stage space?
- Was there sufficient attention to grouping, masking, movement?
